Major General Ralph Royce Pilot US Army

Ralph Royce was born in June of 1890 in Marquette, Michigan. After early schooling in Hancock, he entered the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and graduated there in 1914. This was the beginning of a military career that spanned 32 years with action in World War I and World War II.

After finishing the Signal Corps Aviation

School in 1916, he was assigned to the 1st Aero Squadron at Columbus, New Mexico. In late 1917, he took the 1st Aero Squadron to France as its commander. Royce was reputed to have been the first flyer to negotiate passage over enemy lines in France during WWI.

Following the war, he held various command positions and attended both the Air Corps Tactical and the Army Command and General Staff Schools. In 1928, he became commander, 1st Pursuit Group Selfridge Field Michigan. Major Royce won the Mackay Trophy for leading the January 1930 "Arctic Patrol" flight from Selfridge to Spokane, Washington and return.

Following a General Staff assignment in Washington, D.C., he attended the Army War College. Appointment as Post and 1st Pursuit Group Commander at Selfridge Field preceded his assignment to the Philippines in 1937 where he served as Air Officer until August 1939. In 1941, he was stationed in Australia with the Allied Air Forces and in April 1942, ten days before
